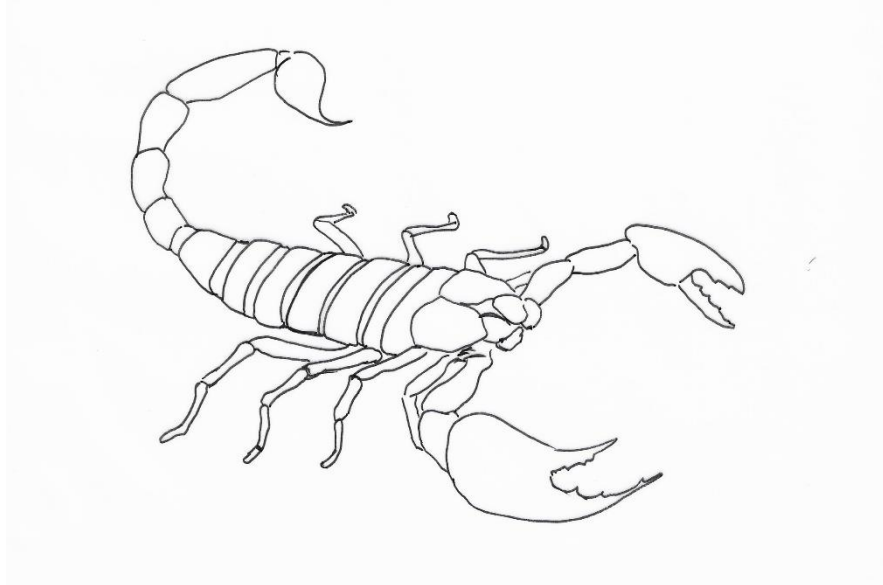

Tasks

1. Please read the passage aloud.

**The scorpion- a member of the spider family**

In warm countries it is not a good idea to put your fingers into small holes in the wall or between stones. You should shake out your shoes if they have been around for a while, left out in the open and unworn. Maybe someone is hiding there. Scorpions don't like the light; preferring to hide during the day in holes or other dark places. Scorpions are common in warm countries all over the world, but they are rarely seen.

They sting their prey to death

Scorpions can be very toxic, although most species are not fatal to man. Depending on species, they vary between one and twenty-one centimetres in length. All species have a venomous sting at the end of their tails. When the scorpion kills its prey, it catches it with its claws, bends its tail over its back, and stabs the quarry. A fearful scorpion quickly turns around to align its sting against the antagonist.

Scorpions hunt large spiders and other creepy crawlies at night. They reach out with their claws forward, grip their prey firmly and kill it with their venomous sting.

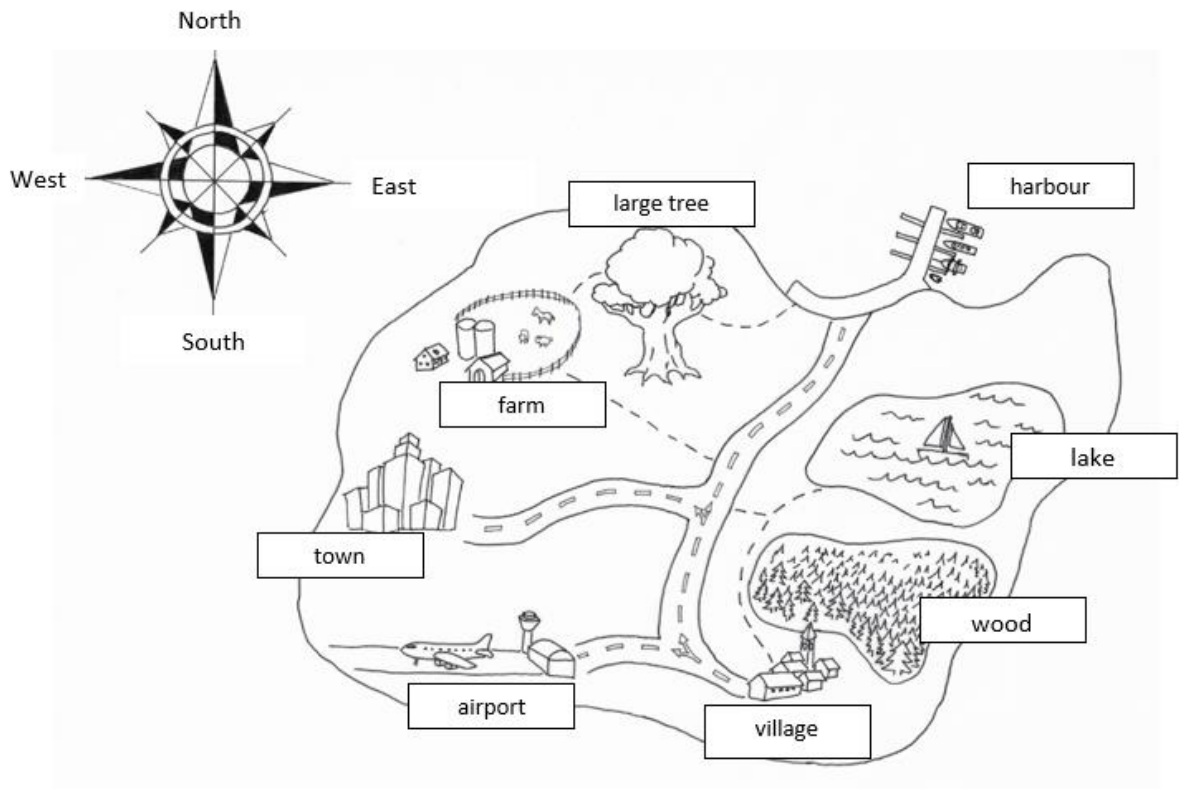

Bushball
